EUFOR raids Maunaga's house

EUFOR troops confiscated a box containing unknown information, which could be related to the ICTY suspects at large.

Venice Comm. discusses HR powers, BiH Constitution

According to a source of Srna news agency, meeting will discuss the possible constitutional changes in BiH, as well as the use of "ethnic veto".

Slobodna Bosna pgs 26-28 'Covic's salvation of Lijanovics' by Asim Metiljevic — SB learns from 'credible source' that the role of protected witness, Zoran Nikolic [BiH media speculated he worked for Lijanovici], in the entire 'Lijanovici' case is not a key testimony for processing Dragan Covic, Mato Tadic, and others, and that it would not jeopardize the process even if it proves to be entirely wrong. SB says it possesses one of the key documents to be used in the trial, which is an official information submitted by FBiH Customs Administration on 6 May 2002 to than FBiH Prosecutor Marinko Jurcevic later used as a ground to raise 90 charges against owners of Lijanovic company. Document allegedly proves that Covic brought unauthorized decision to abolish the taxes on frozen meat waste enabling Lijanovici to avoid paying taxes [such decision could only be brought by CoM]. All 90 cases were lost by Lijanovici before the FBiH Supreme Court, however BiH Constitutional Court returned them back to procedure due to procedural irregularities.

Dani: Lijanovici could avoid process in BiH Dani pgs 24-27 'Lijanovics, owners of animal and human empire in BiH', mentioned on cover, by Snjezana Mulic — Article brings details of the Lijanovici case, and says that Lijanovic company [against whom 1974 cases were submitted to FBiH Supreme Court from 2002 to 2004] could avoid the process in BiH as they possess Croatian citizenship.

Oslobodjenje pg 6 "We were right about the Croat Self-Rule", mentioned on cover, by Az. <u>Kalamujic</u> — The leading officials of the "Croat Self-Rule", Ivo Andric Luzanski and Zdravko Batinic, told daily that "they were absolutely right when they entered the front for protection of Croat interest in BiH in 2001." Day after Prosecutor John McNair dropped charged against them and five other officials for jeopardizing integrity of FBiH in 2001 [by establishing the Croat Self-Rule], Luzanski, who at the time was a Vice President of the FBiH, says he would "do the same thing for Croat equality today." Despite the fact he established that activities of Batinic, Luzanski, Ante Jelavic, Miroslav Prce, Dragan Curcic, Marko Tokic and Petar Milic did act towards the change of constitutional organization in FBiH, McNair was not able to prove that the top officials in this 'project' were ready to use force. "[Self-Rule] was political fight, and not a crime, which we proved in the investigation," said Luzanski and Batinic, who also claim that establishment of the third entity is the best solution for BiH. Vecernji List, pg 5 'Today I look at Croat self-rule with sadness', by Misijana Brkic-Milinkovic — Carries an interview with Marko Tokic, one of indictees in the 'Croat selfrule' case against whom the BiH Prosecution has decided to withdraw the indictment. Commenting on the whole issue, Tokic says the indictment was politically motivated from the very beginning, claiming that the people involved in the 'Croat self-rule' always worked within the boundaries of the BiH Constitution, which is evident in the documents of the 'Croat selfrule' that have been published on the internet.

Dedic — The FBiH Supreme Court confirmed the verdict that was earlier passed by the Cantonal Court in Mostar, which sentenced a former Director of the Mostar Health/Disability Insurance Fund, Ivan Bender, to 4,5 years imprisonment. Bender was charged with abuse of office and authority relating to the sale of Hotel 'Ero', when the hotel was sold by the Fund to Croatia-based companies for a smaller value than envisaged by the book value.

Vecernji List, pg 7, mentioned on front 'By taking oath foreign judges violated Constitution', by <u>Zoran Kresic</u> — The author notes that international judges that work in the BiH Court "took a controversial oath" in Sarajevo on Thursday when they swore to respect the Constitution of BiH and its laws, despite the fact that the legislation in BiH stipulates that judges and prosecutors in BiH have to be BiH citizens. The author also claims that the ceremony was done without the media covering the event, wondering whether the judges have been installed in BiH with a purpose that had been planned in advance. Furthermore, the author notes that the Constitution of BiH does not envisage the institution of BiH Court, underlining that the BiH citizenship is a prerequisite stipulated in the BiH for someone to become a judge or a prosecutor. The author also notes that foreign attorneys cannot be engaged in cases before the BiH Court, which springs the author to say one can label it as double standards, saying it is interesting that the High Representative for BiH, Paddy Ashdown, is concerned in his letter to the Chairman of BiH CoM, Adnan Terzic, in which he calls on BiH authorities to implement the Constitution.

BHT: Decertified police officers announce lawsuit against Ashdown BHT <u>Mirela Cosic</u> — De-certified police officers announce filing of legal suit against the High Representative, Paddy Ashdown, and BiH before the Human Rights Court in Strasbourg. They also announce blockade of the border crossing Izacic. Police officers, de-certified by the UN IPTF, are the only ones who didn't get possibility of revision of those decisions after the HR announced last week revision process of removal decisions issued by OHR in period from 1998 to 2003. Human rights experts believes that there is no reason to treat decertified police officers differently than those whose removals will be reconsidered by the OHR. "More than 70% of our labour disputes are blocked under pressures that comes from the OHR and BiH Presidency and Council of ministers", stated representative of the Association of de-certified police officers, Ramo Suljic. Former HR Wolfgang Petritch stated for BHT that no one should be punished forever (BHT quoted statement from last Thursday). At the press conference in Sarajevo, Ashdown also underlined that revision process involves only the OHR's removal decisions. BH Dani weekly magazine Director, Senad Pecanin, said that exclusion of de-certified police officers from this process, which received court decisions that state their innocence, represents use of double standards.

Dnevni List, pg 9, mentioned on front 'BiH Court could be left without cases', not signed - Carries an interview with the President of BiH Court, Meddzida Kreso, in which she talks about the future of war crimes trials in BiH. Asked as to when the war crimes trials could start at the BiH Court, Kreso says that when it comes to the 'Meakic and others' and 'Stankovic' cases, on which she attended a status conference in The Hague, it all depends on the ICTY and subsequent appeals of the parties involved. However, Kreso says having in mind that decisions in the ICTY are usually taken slowly, the trials could start in one month time plus the time for parties to appeal. Speaking more about the transfer of cases from the ICTY onto the BiH judiciary, Kreso says the BiH Court could be left without cases in case the indictees "run away" to the neighboring countries, which would represent a complete debacle for the whole project of war crimes trials at the BiH Court . Asked whether the BiH Court can demand the extradition of the indictees from the neighboring countries, Kreso says it cannot demand, however it can request, however there is possibility that a state in question rejects the request in case an indictee in guestion has the dual citizenship. In order to get to the indictees, says Kreso, the three countries (BiH, SCG and Croatia) have to reach agreements, stressing it is foremost a political issue.

TV Hayat broadcast story on start of war crime trials in BiH

TV Hayat Semsudin Skejic - Starting from March 11, BiH is enabled to process war crime cases. It seems as if BiH courts are going to have a lot of work since over 10.000 persons have being involved in war crimes. The ICTY has allowed indictments against 661 persons to be raised. The ICTY representatives say that the ICTY has allowed over 800 cases, but it is stated that the processes were going to take to much time. Over 100 cases have been processed within 9 years. "It seems as if BiH judiciary was not ready to process that great number of cases and it is clear that it is a great job. There were probably some political reasons for several cases not to be opened", said the ICTY representative to BiH, Matias Hellman. Hellman adds that it is difficult to have impartial trials before the domestic courts, due to the security issue. Through the survey on corruption, Transparency International find out what BiH citizens think about BiH judiciary. BiH citizens believe that the judiciary is corrupted. "According to surveys, judiciary is one of the 10 most corrupted BiH institutions. Over 55 % citizens believe that almost all judges and prosecutors are corrupted. In that sense we should think about war crime cases. Most of the things in BiH are being politicized", said the Spokesperson to Transparency International, Srdjan Blagovcanin. The OSCE mission has been supervising the process of having war crime cases processed before the domestic courts for over a year, and it is going to state its report on observations it made, within a month.

Battarelo carries that after President of the RS Prisoners of War Association Branislav Dukic criticised Serb member of the BiH Presidency Borislav Paravac because he attended the opening ceremony of the BiH War Crimes Chamber (see yesterday's OHR BiH Media Round-up), the Paravac's office issued a press release which says that 'as a Head of the state Paravac attended the opening ceremony, which was more of state than political character. Such role implies obligations that can be pleasant and unpleasant to a person.' The press release also says that Paravac has always supported the work of the aforementioned Association and he showed it by his presence to a failed attempt to place a memorial plaque in front of barracks 'Viktor Bubanj'. Commenting on this press release, Dukic said that all reactions coming from the Paravac's office serve a political showdown and covering up of the truth and those who are willing to talk about the truth.

Popovic - NN carries an interview with Predrag Ceranic former assistant to director of RS Intelligence Agency (OBS), who was sacked on 31 December 2004. he speaks about the establishment of the Initiative Board of Association of former intelligence officers who were sacked at the end of 2004. The Association is led by Edhem Besic, former executive director of FOSS. Ceranic says the purpose of establishing this Association was to provide legal aid to all those sacked in order to achieve respect of their rights. He warns: "The most recent screening of personnel at State Intelligence and Security Agency has resulted in removal of all those suspected of being involved in radical Islamic elements present in BiH. Furthermore, under the veil of infamous security check, all persons suspected of being engaged in locating war crimes suspects were also removed. On this, Dzuvo, Zaric and Cosic respected the principle that they should not interfere in others' job, meaning each of them made decisions on status of their compatriots." He comments on press question regarding silence of OHR regarding this issue saying that international organisations are presently not interested in the issue as to how the state agency would operate, but instead they were just interested in seeing the institution established.

RHB, BHT, FTV, Oslobodjenje pg 7, mentioned on cover 'Diplomatic note to BiH Government', Dnevni Avaz pg 12 'Zagreb says Croatia is being discriminated' - The Croatian government on Thursday expressed deep dissatisfaction with the BiH Council of Minister's decision to temporarily suspend parts of the free trade agreement with Croatia, describing it as discriminating against Croatian exporters. The government decided to send a diplomatic note to representatives of BiH in Croatia and the Croatian Ambassador to Sarajevo, who will deliver it to the Bosnian authorities. The decision of BiH's Council of Ministers refers to 23 agricultural and food products and imposes customs duties on milk and dairy products, and meat and some meat products. The Croatian Government said it expected that the decision would be withdrawn in the shortest possible time and that joint efforts would be invested to find the best possible solution for both countries. The decision affects only Croatian exporters, and not those from other countries, despite the fact that none of the 23 products to which it refers receive production or export subsidies, according to the Croatian Government. The Council of Ministers passed the decision in anticipation of a bilateral meeting, thus jeopardizing the positive efforts that have been made so far and burdening relations between the two countries, the Government concludes. OHR demands for reconsidering of the decision on customs

C. — A source close to CoM has stated BiH Minister for Foreign Trades and Economic Relations Dragan Doko has received a letter from OHR, in which he was invited to reconsider the decision on introducing customs on certain goods imported from Serbia and Croatia. PDHR Donald Hays has signed the letter.

Bise, Slobodna Dalmacija last pg 'As sign of protest session interrupted' by H carry that a session of the BiH Parliamentary Assembly House of Representatives was interrupted on Thursday since the BiH Council of Ministers did not attend the session. Representative Jozo Krizanovic stated that the session was interrupted since the BiH CoM representatives did not submit the information on temporary suspension of certain provisions from the Free Trade Agreement with Croatia and Serbia and Montenegro and because of irresponsible approach of the BiH CoM towards the HoR. Krizanovic added: 'The session will continue when the BiH CoM secures certain information that the Parliament demands from them.'

RTRSDragana Knezevic — The decision of BIH Council of Ministers on suspension of some items of free trade contract with SCG and Croatia provoked reactions in region and in BIH. BIH House of Representatives discontinued its session on Thursday because none of representatives of BIH CoM were present. Whilst SCG announced possibility of breaking of free trade contract and break of diplomatic relations with BIH, Croatia informed that it won't introduce countermeasures toward BIH. Nikola Spiric Deputy Chair of BIH HoR stated that CoM should have asked for approval from BIH Parliament. Azra Hadziahmetovic from SzBIH stated that the way that the CoM has made this decision

is not in accordance with international regulations. Zlatko Lagumdzija SDP Chairman stated that CoM hasn't protected the domestic production and added that it only violated the international credibility of the country. BIH Parliament asked from BIH CoM to give them information on taken measures regarding the issue of customs tax. This session will probably be continued next week.

Veterans and disabled soldiers must also benefit from that increase of public incomes", stated FBiH Minister of Veterans and disables Soldiers issues, Ibrahim Nadarevic, and added that it would be smarter for any Government to search somewhere else for savings, even on salaries to administration staff. Economy experts say that the international finance institutions requests were expected, because BiH have no economy strategy, said reporter. Deadline for fulfilling of international finance institutions requests is June this year, until when restrictions of budgetary funds should be completed. Discussion on internal debt settlement: RS Government requests for review of foundations to invoke vital national interests clause

Pink, Oslobodjenje pg 2 'Criteria to invoke vital national interest clause' - FENA - Representatives of the RS Government on Thursday have requested from the international representatives in BiH to review the criteria for launching the vital national interest procedure in order to ensure that this procedure is not abused. In this context, the RS Government indicates that vetoing the amendments to the Law on the Executive Procedure by the Bosniak delegates in the RS Council of Peoples has disabled unblocking of the accounts of municipalities Trebinje, Vlasenica and Sekovici, whose functioning has been brought into question by claims for paying wartime damages. The RS Assistant Minister of Finance, Zarko Mionic, told the press that if the Council for Protection of Vital National Interest within the RS Constitutional Court rejects the amendments to the Law on the Executive Procedure, the RS Government would approach alternative solutions. Namely, this could be done by amending the Law on Administration and Local Self-government by which the municipalities would be provided with certain assets and it would be prescribed to which percent a municipality can compensate the wartime damages, i.e. the internal debt. Another solution could be to include the municipalities into the positive Law on Settling the Internal Debt, said Mionic. The matter of the internal debt was considered at the meeting in Banja Luka with participation of representatives of the Entity ministries of finance, administration and local self-government, justice, and economic relations with foreign countries, as well as the representatives of the OHR, OSCE, and several international financial institutions, the IMF, the World Bank and the U.S. Treasury. The RS National Assembly has tasked the RS Government to find the solutions for settling the municipalities' internal debt by March 31.

He said that the deadline for realizing police reform is May this year and stressed that the new system will provide for an efficient battle against the

criminals.

Martens has emphasised the importance of reforming of police forces in BiH. He has said the police reform is one of pre-requisites set by EU and it will not change these standards. He further explained advantages of reforming the police.

Feral Tribune, pg 29 'Ashdown is stalling Bosnia', by Igor Lasic — Carries an interview with the re-elected President of BiH Helsinki Committee, Srdjan Dizdarevic, in which he, whilst talking about the situation in BiH and the role of the High Representative for BiH, Paddy Ashdown, in the country, says the problem with the HR is that he acts in BiH as a viceroy, in other words an imperial representative, who intends to keep the strings in his own hands and who does not show readiness to open dialogue and partnership with others, instead he imposes decisions and removes people. "The problem is in the man, not in the institution of the High Representative. Ashdown obviously wants to permanently stay in BiH, and wants to make it dependant on international factors. It would be sufficient that he acts as an interpreter of the Dayton agreement, and as an aide, but in this relation, things are obviously not moving, the country is becoming more dependent (...) It is clear that we do not have a firm political scene that would counter influences of the IC, a scene that would set itself as a partner, and which would lead the country to independence", says Dizdarevic.

RS President Cavic: No constitution is eternal

Dnevni Avaz pg 5 'There is no country whose constitution is eternal' by Edina Sarac — In an interview to DA, the RS Presidency, Dragan Cavic, says that he is "aware that many in RS will disagree with his opinion, but one has to be open and say that the story on constitutional changes must not be a taboo." Cavic notes that BiH currently undergoes the processes in order to join Euro-Atlantic integrations, and while it waits "all should think what will happen after. Looking at others, it is clear that what follows are the most serious reforms which in a number of ways entire into all pores of lives." Being asked whether, than, he is in favor of constitutional changes, Cavic responds: "There is no country whose constitution is eternal." But, says Cavic, the constitutional changes must not be used to have one people dominate over others. "Constitutional will certainly be changed, only the ambient must be created for it," says Cavic underlying that there is no resistance towards reforms in BiH. On police reform, Cavic says that the key problem is territorial organization as "it is silly to try to shut down current interentity lines and to make some other regional borders." As for the defence reform, Cavic expect next phase to be a discussion on a single army and abolishment of entities Defence Ministries, and he stresses he is "absolutely in favor of admitting this country to NATO." Commenting the cooperation with the ICTY, Cavic says that in last six months RS created the atmosphere in which war crimes suspect at large cannot feel comfortable to hide in RS and in which no political official would dispute legality of ICTY. "The biggest problem is that everybody from public indictments have dual citizenship. We get the orders, and the solution of the problem is in

Belgrade ," concludes Cavic.
