Glas Srpske pg 2 'Sulejman as Alija' by D.Z. — Krstan Simic, SNSD Vice President, reminded Sulejman Tihic, Chairperson of the BiH Presidency, that "BiH is a complicated state, with three equal peoples and other citizens, whose interests should be accomplished through the work of BiH joint institutions".

In yesterday's press release upon

Tihic's statement (that "BiH would not withdraw lawsuit against SiCG before the International Court of Justice in The Hague") Simic noted that Tihic has continued the practise of his predecessor, Alija Izetbegovic, identifying himself with the BiH and making decisions by himself.

FTV, Oslobodjenje pg 3 'Voluntary surrender the best option' - Serbian Prime Minister Vojislav Kostunica called on all war crime suspects to surrender to ICTY. According to him, this would be the best solution for SCG because of its international obligations but also for suspects because the state would be obliged to help them in case of voluntary surrender. Kostunica mentioned example of Croatia , and said that this form of collaboration with ICTY would be the best for SCG as well. He did not say what will happen if they do not surrender voluntarily. Serbian media describe this statement as a step forward compared to his previous opinions but also as the last attempt to ensure full cooperation with ICTY.

BHT - SDA believes that the cooperation with ICTY could be improved if new RS Minister of Interior would be a Bosniak and at the same time the RS Prime Minister announced that new Minister would be appointed soon. However he did not say who that might be.SDA thinks that one of two key positions in RS MoI should be given to Bosniaks, place of Minister or of a Director of RS Police. "First of all that has to be very experienced politician, a professional in Police sector, and the one who enjoys strong support of RS Government and RSNA majority," said Tarik Sadovic from SDA. "Who ever is the Minister his first responsibility will be fulfilment of obligations toward ICTY"- said Dragan Cavic, RS President. Even though, according to some sources close to RS PM Dragan Mikerevic, best chances for the appointment has the current BiH Military Attache in Brussels Darko Matijasevic, Mikerevic still keeps quiet. "I hope that I will soon have the opportunity to announce that name," said Mikerevic.

Ceko concludes that the procurement services during Pope's visit to Banja Luka were violated, and resources

were wasted.

Glas Srpske cover page story 'Conspiracy in imagination' by N.Z. — Spokesperson of Centre of Public Security- Srpsko Sarrajevo, Radovan Pejic has denied the statements of some media in F BiH that there was an attempted assassination of the SiCG's Minister for Human and Minorities' Rights, Rasim Ljajic. Pejic said that in vehicle, which has followed the procession, weren't criminals from Niksic, but plain passengers, who tried to reach their destination a bit faster by joining the procession. RS MoI has denied the information that RS police did not provide the necessary security, including police escort, for Minister Ljajic. He noted: "In accordance with the announcement, we started with escort at 18:00 hrs on 3rd September at the international line Lapisnica, and ended escort services at 20:10 hrs at the border crossing

Skrba claims that it is actually the opposite as F BiH Commission claims, meaning that Federal authorities have been deliberately hiding, for years now, information related to missing Serbs, including sites where they were buried and re-location of graves. He further adds that Federal Commission has been lately deliberately postponing DNA analysis of human remains, in order to keep the false picture pf Bosniaks are major victims during the past war in BiH.

Skrba also says that Federal
Commission used to exchange the bodies
of the Serbs from Sarajevo , murdered
at Sarajevo camps, for the bodies of
the F BiH Army soldiers. He also
accused Federal Commission of having
re-located mass and individual graves
during and shortly after the war, by
which it has covered the traces of
crimes committed.

IC supports introduction of a single VAT rate in BiH

FTV — BiH Council of Ministers accepted a request by International Community regarding a single VAT rate for all products. International Community insists on one VAT rate because of a lack of personnel, which is able to calculate multiple VAT rates. Single VAT rate of 17% would mean that basic food products, like bread, would become more expensive. On the other hand, luxury products, like alcohol or cars, would become cheaper. Budget/Finance Commission of BIH parliament suggested amendments to the proposed law and introduction of three different VAT rates. Renzo Daviddi, Head of Economic and Political Department of European Commission Delegation in BIH: "It's not a question of number of people, but a question of their work and ability to follow different transactions which are necessary. VAT system is quite complicated. I think that, if one VAT rate is implemented, nothing prevents BiH from adding new rates later, as the system becomes more complex, after several years, once when the administration has understood how the VAT system works."

BiH journalists request for three different VAT rates

FTV, Oslobodjenje pg 4 'Zero rate or boycott' - The Coordination of BiH Journalist Associations requested deputies to the BiH House of Representatives to adopt amendments to the draft VAT law and ensure introduction of three different VAT This would ensure introduction of a zero VAT rate for basic food products, textbooks and other publications as well as press. The journalists called on IMF and OHR to respect and protect basic human rights of BIH citizens. If however a single VAT rate is adopted, the Coordination will invite journalists and the public in BIH to boycott political and other activities. They will also request for support to their VAT-related position from journalist associations from throughout the world.

NN op-ed on telecom operators

Nezavisne Novine op-ed pg 7 'Ethnic telecom operators' by M. Cubro — The author is writing about "BH Telekom" starting the op-ed with the statement that Hamdo Katica, Director of "BH Telekom" has the (monthly) salary of BAM 8.5 thousand, but the services of the company he is running are as bad as his salary is. The author claims "BH Telekom" is nowadays vastly lagging behind other two operators in BiH (Telekom Srpske and Eronet), in regard to favourable services it is providing to its users.

<u>Cubro</u> further notes that the three telecommunication operators in BiH have been ethnically divided, substantiating it with the reference to a statement a senior official of the SDA made few months ago that third GSM licence would be allocated to Mostar HT, so that "Bosniaks, Serbs and Croats have their operators".

The author further claims that SDA has placed Katica to this position at "BH Telekom", noting that SDA is still running the policy of holding the monopoly, in order to keep this company and its income under its control. He concludes the article by saying:

"The authority has failed to do anything to change the situation at these firms. Does not this substantiate proof that the power-holders are those making the best benefit of the chaos. It is logical that when the authority makes the money, the citizens are losing it."

DL: 630 former members of HVO go into favourable retirement

Dnevni List, pg 5 '630 members of HVO go into favourable retirement', mentioned on front, by Ivica Glibusic -The HQ for protection of rights members of HVO (750 of them), who were retired by the commander-in-chief in 1997, got an information from competent persons in the FBiH Ministry of Defence regarding the realization of military pensions according to the Decision on favourable conditions for early age retirement of members of the FBiH Army. According to an interpretation of the information by the President of the said HQ, Pero Blazevic, this means that 630 of them will be given the favourable pension, whilst 120 do not meet the requirements.

New affair with Kuwaiti loans in Mostar at sight

Vecernji List, pg 5 'Bosniak loan from Kuwait becomes Croat debt', by Miroslav Vasilj — notes that another affair could soon be surfacing, this time it is about a Kuwaiti loan worth 14 million KMs plus the interest, which the Bosniak authorities took during the times of the Interim Statute of Mostar, when six municipalities were in place.

According to VL, the money was allegedly spent on infrastructure, but only in the Bosniak-majority areas and after the municipalities ceased to be, all the liabilities were transferred onto the single, city budget, which in turn means that all Mostarians, regardless of their nationality, will have to return the loan in case it is included in the city budget. VL goes on to say that the Croat side is unhappy with efforts of the Bosniak side to 'shove' the loan into the city budget, which could cause more problems to the implementation of the Mostar Statute. VL also learns that the loan was

VL also learns that the loan was discussed during the last visit to Kuwait by Haris Silajdzic and the High Representative for BiH, Paddy Ashdown, and apparently there were efforts to write the loan off, but the Kuwaiti authorities were clear in saying that the loan must be returned.

The four locations include the Janja area, an area along the Belgrade-Bar railway line and the space around the hydro-electric power plants Zvornik and Bajna Basta. Halilovic warns of an inappropriate almost ignorant attitude of the BiH state bodies towards this issue. Halilovic also believes that the international community as a guarantor of the Dayton Peace Agreement has an obligation to protect BiH state borders.

Dnevni List, front and pg 7 'Croatia will not allow continuation of problems in Aluminij', by Ana Andjelic - carries an interview with the Deputy Mayor of Mostar, Ljubo Beslic, who was recently received by the Croatian Prime Minister, Ivo Sanader, together with the CEO of 'Aluminij' Company of Mostar, Mijo Brajkovic. Talking about the meeting with PM Sanader, Beslic notes that PM Sanader is well informed about the situation in BiH and Mostar and that talks were held about the political situation, forthcoming local elections in BiH and relations within the HDZ. Regarding the talks on Aluminij, Beslic is quoted as saying: "A full support was given to Brajkovic and it was said that Croatia would not allow any problems with supply of electricity, and that Sanader would get involved should any problems occur".

Deputy Mayor Beslic was also asked to comment on the Mostar Statute: "The new Statute is not good, but if you look at what we had had before, the situation back then was much worse. The new Statute is therefore a big step forward. I hope it is interim as was the one before it and that it represents a transition towards making a normal Mostar, a European city. BiH cannot go to Europe with the Mostar Statute because it takes away certain human rights. It will have to change if BiH wants to go to the EU".

Vecernji List, pg 5 'Croatian language is not endangered, Croat children will learn it', by Miso Relota — carries an interview with the Canton 7 Prime Minister, Miroslav Coric, in which he comments on the issue of language(s) in elementary and secondary schools. "As far as the curriculum and language for the Croats, as well as the Bosniaks and Serbs, are concerned, I can say there are no reasons to be afraid. Children that want lectures in the Croatian language, it will be enabled to them. I responsibly claim that the Croatian language was never in question. This year we will have in Ivanjica, municipality of Ravno, lectures in the Serb language, according to the Serb curriculum. Bosniaks will have lectures in their own, and Croats in their own language. The law on elementary and secondary education in the Herzegovina-Neretva Canton is good, everything else I can label as speculations, which serve pre-election campaign", says Coric. PM Coric also notes that the HNC budget for 2004 will likely be subjected to re-balancing in late September since the collection of revenues is not matching the plans.

Apparently, all the public companies in the FBiH that have either a national or state determination in their names, will have to lose them. VL notes that almost every big public company in the FBiH has either 'Croat', 'BH' or 'BiH' prefix in their names, which suggest that they belong to a certain people or state, something that will have to change in the future.

Halilovic supports special status of Srebrenica Dnevni List, pg 5 'There would be justice for Srebrenica if it were in RS', not signed — The President of Presidency of SBiH, Safet Halilovic, supported the special status of Municipality of Srebrenica in BiH stressing that "there would be justice for Srebrenica if it were not in composition of the RS". Halilovic also stated that "justice for the RS is that Srebrenica exists and shows the way the RS was created".

Herceg Bosna Radio, BHT, FTV, RTRS, Oslobodjenje pg 3, mentioned on cover 'Peace is a pre-condition for development', **Dnevni Avaz** pg 3, mentioned on cover 'The young people can be agents for changes in the world', ONASA — A two-day World Bank's conference dubbed "Youth, Development and Peace" was opened in Sarajevo on Sunday, and will be attended by approximately 170 youth representatives from 83 countries and 40 senior officials of the World Bank and other international organizations. Education, employment, conflict prevention and resolving, high-risk behavior and AIDS are among the key topics that will be discussed during the conference, jointly prepared by the European Youth Forum and World Scout Organization in cooperation with the BiH Council of Ministers. "The title of the conference reflects our devotion. Youth, development and peace are what we are focusing on," the BiH prime minister, Adnan Terzic, said at the opening of the Conference. Terzic said that BiH youth have greatly contributed to the drafting of the BiH Development Strategy. "This convinced us that the youth can take responsibility if they are given the right opportunity," he said Vecernji List, pg 2, 'Youth needs specific help, not mere analysis', by Renata Radic, and Dnevni List, pg 3, 'Through youth policy to needed changes', by <u>Vedran Vujovic</u> – VL carries that, on the first day of the "Youth, development, peace 2004" conference which is being held in Sarajevo under the auspices of the World Bank and the European Youth Forum, one could hear that education, employment, prevention and resolution of conflicts are the areas in which state institutions should help the young people. UNDP to present study on small and light weapons in BiH Dnevni List, pg 2 'Republika Srpska leads the way when it comes to number of armed people', by NINA — the UN Development Programme will present the public a study on small and light weapons in BiH in Sarajevo tomorrow, the aim of which is to inform politicians, the IC and wider public about post-war challenges BiH is facing when it comes to arms and ammunition. Apparently, there are registered 353.000 pieces of weapons owned by civilians, of which 200.000 in the RS, 144.500 in the FBiH and 8.500 in the Brcko District. UNDP notes it is very hard to even measure how much illegal weapons there are among the citizens.

Serbs from Tuzla to ask for removal of Bishop Vasilije

Vecernji List, pg 8 'Serbs from Tuzla request removal of Bishop Kacavenda', by Miro Petrovic noting that the Serbs made as much as 25% of the pre-war population in the Municipality of Tuzla, the number which is now down to 2%, VL reports that the Serb Civic Council of Tuzla (SGV) is blaming the Bishop of Zvornik-Tuzla, Vasilije Kacavenda, for the situation. According to the President of SGV in Tuzla, Miso Bozic, more Serbs would be returning if there were more Orthodox religious officials in the Tuzla area, however Bozic claims that Bishop Kacavenda is preventing the return of Orthodox priests. Bozic also announces that the SGV of Tuzla is preparing to visit the Patriarch Pavle Belgrade and ask for removal of Bishop Kacavenda, who allegedly prevents the return of Orthodox priests to Tuzla and advocates that the Serbs sell their property in Tuzla and move elsewhere.
