At the 4th RS NA session held on March 21st, a law on Changing the Law on Customs Policy was made. The RS is now obliged to apply the BiH Law on Customs Tariffs.

At the tribune, organised by the Helsinki Committee for Human Rights of the RS, Hanns Schumacher particularly welcomed the change in the general mood in RS, which is being created by the actions of the new Government.
